

The County shall provide for a Community Program Planning process (CPPP) as the basis for developing the Three-Year Program and Expenditure Plans and updates per Title 9 CCR § 3300

- CPPP was conducted between 4/27/20-5/31/20
- 627 surveys collected
- 12 focus groups consisting of 198 participants

County mental health programs shall prepare and submit a Three-Year Program and Expenditure Plan (Plan) and Annual Updates for Mental Health Service Act (MHSA) programs and expenditures.

Figure 2. Participant's Ethnicity (n=553)





Figure 3. Participant's Race (n=612)


All Public Comments/Responses are included in final MHSA Three Year Plan and/or Plan Update


Figure 4. Participant's Stakeholder Group (n=601)





Figure 5. Top Five Priority Mental Health Needs for Children, Youth and TAY (N=627)




CPPP Survey Highlights: Adults & Older Adults Top Five Priority Mental Health Needs



CPPP SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS: NOT ADEQUATELY SERVED BY SYSTEM


Figure 7. Populations or Groups not Adequately Served by System (n=591)



Sacramento Weekly Report January 8, 2021

Week in Review

The deadline for the Governor to submit the budget is on Sunday, January 10thbut after leaking certain aspects of the budget to the press throughout the week, the Governor released his full proposed State Budget today, Friday, January 8, during a press conference.

The Legislature returns on Monday, January 11, 2021. Bill introductions have been coming in since December 7th and the PS team, in collaboration with County Staff, continue to track relevant bills for Alameda County.

DHCS Releases CalAIM Proposal

Today DHCS released a revised CalAIM proposal. The new draft can be accessed <u>HERE</u>. An executive summary, including summary of changes made from the previous draft can be accessed <u>HERE</u>. DHCS will be holding a webinar on January 28 to introduce the new proposal.

CDPH Community Vaccine Advisory Committee

The California Department of Health (CDPH) Community Vaccine Advisory Committee held a meeting on Wednesday, January 6th, discussion was centered on movement to the next phase, Phase 1b Tier 1. We are currently still in Phase 1a, which includes healthcare workers & long-term care residents, and will be moving to Phase 1b Tier 1 which encompasses the 75+ age group, essential workers in education and child care, emergency services and food and agricultural. It was stated that there is no ranking of essential workers in phase 1b, adding to the challenges faced in the distribution process. Those in Phase 1b Tier 1 will need to sign on to registries managed by state and counties to be scheduled for vaccine. The next meeting will be held on January 20, 2021.

Bay Area Impact: The Path to Vaccines

On Thursday, the Bay Area Council held a zoom call with CDPH's Dr. Erica Pan and Sue Desmond-Hellmann, Pfizer Board Member to discuss the COVID-19 vaccine, give an update on California's vaccine rollout and delve into what the future of vaccines may look like.

Dr. Pan stated that local jurisdictions will be on different distribution tiers at different times and that local county public health officers will be managing. Notes from the meeting are attached.

Budget

Governor Gavin Newsom unveiled his proposed 2021-2022 state budget, a \$227 billion proposal that reflects the "reality of recession induced impacts on low-wage workers, small businesses, and decades-long inequalities." The proposed budget prioritizes vaccinations, safely re-opening schools, support for small businesses, getting money into the pockets of Californians, and wildfire preparedness.

Outside of the normal budget process, the Governor is calling for a \$5 billion immediate action package to include:

- \$2 billion to reopen schools safely;
- \$575 million in small business grants;
- \$71 million in fee waivers for small businesses;
- \$2.4 billion for the Golden State Stimulus; and
- An extension of the eviction moratorium passed by the Legislature in 2020.

Re-Opening Schools

The Governor's proposed budget calls for an additional \$2 billion in immediate action to help aid in the safe reopening of schools starting in February. This proposal prioritizes in-person instruction for the state's youngest students to curb the challenges experienced with distance learning and recover from the impacts of the pandemic.

Housing and Homelessness

Today's proposed budget includes new investments for housing to build on the progress that has been made on the housing crisis including \$500 million for the low-income housing tax credit, \$500 million for the infill infrastructure grant program, \$8.5 million for construction apprenticeship programs. In addition, the Governor has proposed the creation of the Housing Accountability Unit to provide technical assistance and hold local government accountable to increasing housing production.

The proposed budget also includes \$1.75 billion in one-time general fund money to purchase additional motels and hotels to expand Project Roomkey and Homekey, develop community mental health housing, and create new units and preserve existing housing units for vulnerable seniors.

Health

As the budget document indicates, the COVID-19 pandemic has accentuated the need for health care for all. The Governor remains focused on reducing healthcare costs, lowering prescription prices, and expanding telehealth services. Included in the today's proposed budget is the formation of a new Office of Health Care Affordability. The Office of Health Care Affordability will address provider consolidation, regional disparities, and develop cost targets for all sectors. The budget also proposes the creation of the Office of Medicare Innovation and Integration to support long-term care innovation.



Budget Cont.

The budget includes \$1.1 billion to implement the California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM) initiative. The CalAIM initiative would transform the state's Medi-Cal program to improve outcomes and reduce costs.

Climate

\$1.5 billion is included in the Governor's proposed budget to help achieve the state's zero-emission vehicle goals by 20235 and 2045. The Governor's climate proposals include securitizing up to \$1 billion to accelerate the pace and scale of the infrastructure needed to support zero-emission vehicles. In addition to zero-emission vehicles, the budget prioritizes toxic site cleanup and proposes \$300 million one-time General Fund money for the cleanup of contaminated properties.

Wildfire and Emergency Response

The Governor is proposing an additional \$1 billion to address wildfire resiliency and bolster emergency response in the state including \$143 million to support 30 new fire crews, \$48 million for Black Hawk helicopters and large air tankers, \$39 million for LiDAR remote sensing, and \$17.3 million to enhance the Earthquake Early Warning System.

Governor Gavin Newsom

Monday, January 4, 2020

Governor Newsom, joined by CHHS Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly, gave an update on the state's continued response to COVID-19. While today's briefing focused on issues with oxygen supply and stress on the health care system in LA and the San Joaquin Valley, the Governor also confirmed the new strain of COVID-19 has been detected in California. Four individuals in San Diego and two individuals in San Bernardino have been identified with the new strain, and contact tracing and disease investigation is currently underway.

Tuesday, January 5, 2020

Governor Newsom convened a virtual conversation with Senators, Assemblymembers, and advocates to announce the <u>Golden State Stimulus</u> plan. This budget proposal will help low-income Californians by providing \$600 direct cash payments to approximately 4 million Californians. The stimulus plan would also extend the eviction protections that were enacted by AB 3088(Chiu, 2020).

To accomplish this, the Governor called for immediate action with his legislative partners, through urgency legislation, and plans to distribute checks within 3 to 4 weeks of signing the urgency legislation.
